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

'Arts & Glam' Guide Summer Camp



The Area 'Arts & Glam' Camp was a three day residential camp at Kingswood Lodge at the end of July with 24 Guides (ages 9-12) from nine Districts. The Area Camp Committee's goal was to have a camp where girls could be creative in the Arts (crafts, music, drama and dance) with a touch of 'Glam' (hair and nail care), having fun, swimming and

making new friends.

The weather was gorgeous and the girls enjoyed canvas painting outside in the shade with their palettes of colors having only three primary paints (red, blue, and yellow) and white. They learned how to blend colors making secondary colors and adding white paint to make shades of pastels.

In the lodge, Veda, a third year medical student, shared her cake decorating skills with the girls showing them how to decorate cupcakes creating a 'Sunflower' and a 'Flaming Campfire' with mini marshmallows that everyone enjoyed at snack time (every girl received a decorating tip to take home following the camp).





The girls organized

their own lip sync groups, selecting songs and making up choreography to 'Shout' and 'YMCA' with presentations before campfire (very talented young ladies).

Having fun exploring creativity

Over the three days we creatively worked with 'The Passport to the Arts', a BC Program Challenge, covering 'five regions' of Guiding plus Around the World with crafts, music, dance and drama. Origami was a girl lead activity by Ako and Karley, making mini peace cranes. Other activities included wooden worry dolls, weaving bracelets, learning pantomime, World Tour charades, and dance. Guider Lauren worked with the girls in

'how to build a campfire' including songs from the five regions.

The girls loved 'shucking corn' before a 10km hike (total) to and from camp for swimming at the Saanich Commonwealth Pool. The girls were disappointed when the pool was evacuated losing the last half an hour of swimming due to a 'code brown' in the pool (a camping memory).

Sunday was 'Glam Day', after packing up gear and camp cleanup, with hair braiding, making decorated hair clips, learning nail care, using emory boards and painting their nails.





Our closing included 'Two Stars and a Wish' with the 'shining star' being making new friends and their 'wish' that the camp was longer!

June 2019 - As a first for the Royal Jubilee Hospital laboratory, the 1st Portage Pathfinders had the opportunity to take the inaugural tour!

It all started when Catriona Gano, Island Health Laboratory Director, kindly lent support for our request, after we had visited a super cool research lab at UVIC and an interest in what a laboratory does was kindled. Wilson Louie, Chief Technician (HR), (and his family!) volunteered his evening so that he could tour the girls around and chat about what transpires there on a daily basis.

We split into two groups, as 17 seemed a bit much to hike through all at once! While the tour was on for one-half of the girls, the other half hung out in the conference room doing a lab research worksheet on types of cells and their uses.

The girls were awed and amazed at the varied duties in the lab and were most engaged, paying close attention to Wilson as he explained the various machines and their uses. He also explained the diverse departments within the lab and how they are utilized to help patients.

Comments were made about the size of the lab and how busy it was (and this was between 7 and 8:30 in the evening). They also asked questions about the different kinds of jobs, encompassing the amount of education required, pay scale and job security.

We watched blood samples being zoomed around analyzers and being redirected to the correct machine for each kind of test. We were told about the blood bank and the work that it does for patients. We spoke about blood test turn-around-times and their importance for quick interventions.

Some of the staff were able to speak about the work that they were doing and then show the girls a few of the tools of their job. A lovely lady in Microbiology was showing the girls the Petri dishes with growths that she was analyzing, as well as some pictures on her computer of other kinds of specimens. Another showed the girls the types of cells that she was counting and how to tell what each kind of cell was (size, shape, colour, etc.)

In histology, a technician was opening a specimen for fixation and the girls were fascinated by the technique and the tissue itself. They looked rather wide-eyed at all the various specimen trolleys awaiting processing and were unsure how they felt about the limbs in the limb fridge, but then were super thrilled to see a finger in a container! Somewhat macabre, perhaps, but maybe the harbinger of a career to come? (The lab industry currently is experiencing a shortage of techs!)

All in all, an informative and engaging evening of learning. Perhaps someday one of the girls will be back for a career and will remember being shown the various parts of the lab and its duties!

Our humungous thanks to all of the evening shift people that cheerfully put up with their work spaces being crowded and disrupted by gaggles of teenaged girls; their patience and graciousness were greatly appreciated by us all! Also, thanks to Wilson and Catriona for supporting this amazing opportunity for the 1st Portage Pathfinders!

Staying Afloat at 2019 Dip-N-Swing

Summer days floating on the lake just can't be beat. Dip-N-Swing 2019 was three such days in August at Kingswood Camp for 20 Guides (ages 9-12). The SVI Area Camp Committee typically organizes a summer camp the year before SOAR so girls have a chance to add to their tent camping nights and build on their camping experiences. This

time we chose paddling as the theme to showcase what Kingswood Camp has to offer, and to prepare Guides and Leaders for water sports at Camp Barnard next SOAR.

My paddle's keen and bright;

The Kingswood Camp Committee has been busy reinvigorating our SVI Paddling Program, adding a new canoe and 6 youth paddles, several PFDs, and leader training this year.

Dip-N-Swing was designed to provide two on-lake canoe paddling days, along with other water sports – Stand Up Paddleboarding, kayaking, and snorkelling at Saanich Commonwealth Pool – as well a variety of crafts, land games, outdoor cooking, and a

"non-flame" campfire. Of course, we ordered perfect weather, not too hot and no rain.

Each paddling session consisted of 5 canoes with one adult and two girls in each canoe, 10 Guides per session. You would be amazed at the range of sizes of the Guides (unless you are a Guide Leader), so we paired smallest with largest Guides. Some had previous experience, but all first went through on-land safety training – weather check, on-land observer, whistle signals, communication, proper PFD fitting, communication, paddle use, communication, emergency procedures, and did we mention communication? Colene led the instructions and used her inflatable kayak as a means to maneuver quickly on the water if someone needed some specific assistance. We practiced regular forward and backward

strokes, sweeps, pry and draw, and on the second day the girls tried the J-stroke for steering. Paddling ended with a fun ball game, wind on our face and backs, and a whole pile of confidence. For the adults, this was an excellent chance to practice their skills, as several had just taken Level 1 Tandem Canoe training.



Day 1 not only included the first paddling opportunity but also a 10 km walk to and from the Saanich Commonwealth Place for more water sports (and a shower!). Guides and Leaders slept well that night. Day 2 most of the Guides decided to try Stand Up Paddleboarding, after we explained the CRD water advisory and insisted everyone rinse off after paddling. Colene provided back-up on the water with her inflatable kayak, in case anyone fell in – no one did – as the Guides realized how well-balanced they are on the boards. Shore activities included tie-dying an individual T-shirt, to be washed and dried at home after camp. We can only imaging what a photo would look like with all those colourful shirts lined up on the Guides. More fun followed in the form of an 'Amazing Race', a wide game of "Vanishing Post Box", and a BBQ chicken dinner. A flameless campfire was led by Bay to Bay Guides under the tutelage of Trickster Raven (Becky), ending another perfect day.

Day 3 started with packing up, then more canoeing, this time with a challenging breeze. On shore, Guides conducted some camp maintenance and finished packing, wishing they could camp longer. Their confidence shone in their faces, which perked up as parents collected their paddler Guides and listened to their stories.

Food was planned and arranged by an experienced team, with Meaghan at the helm complete with her helper (Brownie daughter) Arya, who became the camp mascot. We won't let on that Meaghan is well along in her pregnancy, which meant we all wanted to rub her back to make her smile. Guides had several meals to prepare and cook, which they did with style in their tent patrols.



In between cooking and eating, Guides and Leaders from almost all of the SVI Districts, met new silver friends and kept the old gold ones. If you see a Guide/Leader in a gorgeous handmade tie-dyed T-shirt, she may have been at Dip-N-Swing 2019.

And just like that I was going to Sangam! We planned to do a week-long tour of Northern India before going down to Pune for our Sangam program.

And then when I thought this adventure I was planning couldn't get any better, Betsy asked what my plans were after I left Hong Kong. I told her about how I was going to travel in India and attend a programme in Sangam. Imagine my surprise when she asked if she could join us!

After

months of planning, it felt like I was dreaming when I got on my plane to Taipei. I met my friend from Our Chalet, Samantha (from Australia), in our hostel in Taipei, and we spent the next few days exploring northern Taiwan together. We were soon travelling together to Hong Kong, to see the bride-to-be, and our other Our Chalet friends. Betsy met us at the Hong Kong airport, as we shared a series of hugs, laughs, and tears. The first time I met Betsy, it was in the Vienna, Austria Airport arrivals section, when I walked up to her and said "Are you our Betsy? Let's go, we have a bus to catch!". We laughed at the memory, and at how it was now reversed, with her ushering me to a bus this time. She took us to the main train station where we would meet Janka (from Slovakia). Then, all together Betsy led us to

It was such a fun day, as we reminisced old memories, and enjoyed making new ones.

We all got up early, and travelled by bus to a stunning seaside hotel, which would be the location of the traditional Chinese ceremony that Betsy had invited us to. The Chinese ceremony was incredible, while we didn't understand all of what was happening (the bridesmaids and groomsmen helped us by translating and explaining when they could), it was clear to see how in love the soon to be wed couple was, regardless of language. After the Chinese

ceremony and pictures, we met with Haruka (from Japan), who was one of the participants at Our Chalet during our summer there, and all travelled with the wedding party by bus to the venue for the Church wedding. There we also reunited with Suki (from Hong Kong) who was a volunteer at the Kandersteg Scout Centre the same time we were volunteering at Our Chalet. The ceremony was beautiful and touching, and an experience so special, I will never, ever forget it. After the ceremony, Betsy and her new husband, Kevin, led us out to the reception, which was such a fun party featuring custom cocktails representing different memories of the couple, a very delicious and adorable snack selection, and even an ice cream bar! I spent the days following the wedding exploring Hong Kong with my friends, as one by one the others left to continue their adventures. I had such a wonderful time exploring Hong Kong and enjoying all that it had to offer.

Before I knew it, it was time for the next adventure to begin. I met Betsy at the airport early in the morning,

and we set off together to Delhi, where we would meet Becca and then embark on our Golden Triangle tour. Though Becca and Betsy had never met before, after a brief airport

We spent a day and a half in Delhi where we toured new Delhi by car, and Old Delhi by rickshaw, both of which were thrilling experiences none of us will soon be forgetting! We visited Mosques and temples, national landmarks, and even had Guinness world record book samosas. From Delhi we travelled to an elephant

sanctuary, where we got to learn about their important work, and visit with some of the rescued elephants. We continued on to Agra, where we toured the impressive Red Fort, and experienced the Taj Mahal. Visiting the Taj Mahal was an experience like I've never had



before. We were all completely awe-struck by the sheer magnificence of this symbol of ever-lasting love.

Our tour continued to the Ranthembhore region, were we visited the national park hoping to see the elusive Bengal tigers, and taking in all of the other wildlife and nature that thrives on the protected lands. As we continued on toward Pushkar, we could tell we were getting close by the increasing number of camels we saw along the road – we arrived in time for the Pushkar festival; yes there really were 10,000 camels! As we continued our journey, the camel sightings along the road gave way to elephant sightings as we neared Jaipur, where were toured the incredible Amer Fort and took in a Bollywood movie at one of the most popular movie theatres in the world. After an incredible, action packed week, our tour was over, and it was time to travel to Pune, where Sangam awaited us!

As soon as we walked through the doors of Sangam, we felt at home. Despite a long day of travelling, we were energized to be at Sangam – a dream for all of us that was now reality! We were so warmly welcomed by the Sangam staff and volunteers, so much so that we were immediately invited to join the bachelorette party they were hosting for one of the staff whose wedding was


upcoming! We joined in for games, food, and dancing, in what was an absolutely perfect beginning to our time at Sangam. Once again, that power of the Sisterhood

dancina.


was apparent, as we felt like family right away.

We watched Bollywood movies, made friends with the staff and volunteers, we tried crafts, we swam in the pool, did yoga, and climbed water towers to watch the sunrise. We sang songs, we shared stories, we drank chai (so much chai!), and we even played badminton while wearing our saris (a much harder task than it looked!). We also got to visit some of the community partners that Sangam works with, getting to see first-hand the powerful work that they are doing. We got to visit national monuments, historical sights, religious buildings, and more! As I reflect on it, I'm amazed at all that we saw and did in our 6 days at Sangam; it was such a special experience. I am



thankful that I was able to make my dream of experiencing Sangam, a reality.

As with any journey, it must come to an end, something that is never easy. Saying goodbye to Sangam, to our new friends, and to my wonderful travel partners Becca and Betsy, was hard. But we all vowed not to say goodbye, but rather to say 'Phir Milenge', Hindu for 'we will meet again', promising one another that there would be a next time, someday, somewhere. And as this trip with its many Guiding reunions proved, next time will happen. I can't wait to see where in the world Guiding takes me next.

B.C. Community Achievement Award

Margaret Lidkea is a member of 1st Victoria Trefoil Guild and has been a Chatham District Guider for many years. She started the program to remove invasive species from Uplands Park when she was a Guider for the 4th Victoria Guides in Chatham District.

Her work with the invasive species removal program has been so significant that she has been nominated for one of the 2019 B.C. Community Achievement Awards.

"It's humbling to get this award, just like it has been so humbling to have so many volunteers put their time into Uplands and Anderson Hill" Margaret said.

Councilor Hazel Braithwaite wrote a letter nominating Margaret for a B.C. Community Achievement Award. The longtime Oak Bay resident remembers accompanying her daughter in Brownies over to Uplands Park in the 1990s where Margaret, as a Girl Guides leader, led an interactive session about invasive plants in Uplands Park.

It's a battle that continues today said Margaret, president of the Friends of Uplands Park.

"We're still trying to restore the grassy lands that are some of the most diverse in the country, in one of the most unique ecosystems [Garry oak] in the country," she said.

Today she manages Friends of Uplands Park, with a volunteer mailing list of over 550 people.

Margaret is most deserving of this award. She gives generously of her time but more than that, her engaging personality draws people in and inspires them. She has a unique manner when teaching adults and children that shares knowledge and captures enthusiasm. When Margaret teaches she changes people for the better. She is outgoing, fun, positive, inclusive, energetic, has a big laugh, and her personality is bigger than the room she is in.
